Clinical Mental Health Counseling, M.S.



Memaster's degree in Clinical Mental Health Counseling prepares professional counselors whose psychological understanding of human persons and practice of counseling are essentially informed, shaped and given dimension by a biblicallybased view of humankind. This degree is designed to meet Texas Licensed Professional Counselor's (LPC) academic requirements and meets most other state licensure academic requirements. Students seeking state licensure should check acceptance by any state other than Texas.



Getting Started...

Students who do not hold a regionally accredited undergraduate degree in counseling, psychology, social work, or a related area will be considered on a case by case basis and must successfully complete the following 6 hours of undergraduate courses:

- Abnormal Psychology
- Theories of Personality



Course Delivery Options

The majority of the psychology courses are offered both on-line & on-campus. Some courses are only offered on campus so we can most effectively equip students to meet state academic licensure requirements.





On-Campus Required Courses

The Harrison Graduate School's Clinical Mental Health Counseling program includes several on-campus requirements designed to meet Texas requirements for licensure purposes. On-campus required courses include:

- Methods of Group Counseling
- Tests and Assessment
- Clinical Psychopathology
- Advanced Psychopathology and Treatment Planning



Course Scheduling

While planning your course schedule, please keep in mind:

- On-campus courses during the fall and spring semesters meet once a week, Monday, Tuesday or Thursday, at 6:30-9:30pm.
- On-campus courses during the summer are offered as two-week intensive sessions. Class lectures meet for a four-hour period daily (Mon-Fri) per course: 8 am-12 pm, 1 pm-5 pm, and 6pm-10pm. Students use the rest of the summer to complete the coursework. In this way, a student can meet the on-campus lecture requirement for up to three courses maximum per summer.
- Courses in the Practicum and Internship Component Area will require synchronous supervision sessions. These sessions will be held virtually once a week in the evenings and will be required to complete the course.

Course Progression

- Statistics is prerequisite to Psychological Methods & Research Design
- Clinical Psychopathology is prerequisite to Advanced Psychopathology & Treatment Planning







Staying in Contact

It is highly recommended that you stay in contact with your program coordinator at the beginning of each semester to aid you in the course selection process. They will have access to the projected course rotations and help you develop and maintain a personalized degree plan that matches your desired pace in relation to anticipated required course offerings.

Pre-Practicum

A foundation for all practicum and internship experiences, this course helps students to learn basic assessment, attending and interpersonal skills in working with children, adolescents and adults under faculty supervision. Consideration is given to the development of professionalism, proper utilization of the clinical interview and history taking as well as the application of counseling and psychotherapeutic approaches emphasizing skill development. Role playing and various laboratory exercises are provided that help to develop the student's professional skills. Prerequisites include COU 5153, COU 5143, PSY 5193, PSY 5743

Practicum

Students will complete a supervised practicum experience for 100 hours over a 10 week period. 40 hours must be direct services. Students will participate in individual and/or triadic supervision a well as group supervision with a site supervisor and counselor education program faculty member. Students must complete 1.5 hours of group supervision per week. (Prerequisites: COU 5353, COU 6413).

Additional requirements includes a background check and specific insurance coverage.

Internship in Clinical Mental Health Counseling I and II

Students will complete a supervised internship experience for 300 hours over a semester (in combination with COU6993: Internship in Clinical Mental Health Counseling II, students must complete a total of 600 hours). 120 hours must be direct (during each internship). Students will participate in individual and/or triadic supervision as well as group supervision with a site supervisor and counselor education program faculty member. Students must complete 1.5 hours of group supervision per week. (Prerequisites: Graduate-standing and COU5353, COU6413, COU6963).





Comprehensive Exams

CMHC students must complete a Comprehensive Examination consisting of the parts, objective, essay and oral, during their final semester. At that time a Comprehensive Exam Course will be uploaded onto the student's Blackboard with detailed instructions outlined by the program coordinator. Each portion of the exam should be scheduled through the Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program Coordinator. From the very beginning of the program, it would be wise for students to save all course work and syllabi in preparation for this final exam.
