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OVERVIEW

Students will learn how to effectively reach students, develop them through discipleship, and send them into the mission field of their school campus. Handson opportunities inside and outside of church settings are given to provide students with both the academic and experiential nature of learning.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Students are equipped to work with adolescents both inside and outside of a church setting. The skills learned about adolescent development and culture, translate well to any field where the person is interacting with middle and high school students. Serving as a youth pastor, ministry director, college minister, Youth Alive campus missionary, Chi-Alpha missionary, para-church ministries, and compassion ministries reaching teens in crisis are just some of the ways students have used their education to make a positive impact on adolescents across the globe.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Several District Youth Directors and Youth Alive campus missionaries have graduated from this program making a meaningful impact on student ministries across the globe. Hundreds of students have served faithfully in local church settings as youth pastors and student ministry directors, growing and loving adolescents. One student worked with at-risk teenage boys discipling and teaching life skills in the wilderness. Another served in a home for unwed teen mothers. And still another served alongside the military chaplain to have youth services for base teens. Ministry to adolescents looks different and we train for the possibilities.
- Few programs offer the number of youth and student ministry focused courses as Southwestern while also preparing the student for the ministry possibilities awaiting as they further their ministry. The assignments are practical and experiential. Students spend time on the public-school campus, they practice water baptism, they have in-class worship experiences, and learn to discern pop culture.
