F. J. DAKE JOINS FACULTY

At the top of this column and of the one on the other side of the page, are the pictures of our new faculty members, Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Dake. Our readers will remember that in

our last issue we mentioned the fact that we were expecting Brother and Sister Dake to join us soon. They arrived about the first of November

and began their work at once.
Finis J. Dake was trained in Glad Tidings Bible Training School, San Francisco, California, and Central Bible Institute, Springfield, Mo. While attending these schools he engaged in much practical work as a preacher and teacher.

After leaving school he engaged in pastoral and evangelistic work. He was pastor for a time in Joliet, Ill.,

was pastor for a time in Johet, Ill., and later at Amarillo, Tex. His work carried him all over the middle west. After his Amarillo pastorate he was made principal of the Texico Bible School Later he was made pastor of an Assembly of God at Dellas Teves. Dallas, Texas.

Brother Dake has a full schedule in the Southwestern Bible School. His subjects are: "Dispensational Truth", Second and Third Year Prophecy, Second and Third Year Epistles, Homiletics and Hermeneutics.

Besides his teaching work, Bro. Dake is in charge of the new dormitory building and is directing the music in the Enid Gospel Tabernacle.

OKLAHOMA DISTRICT COUNCIL MEETING

Doubtless the best session of the Oklahoma District Council of the Assemblies of God which was ever held, convened the 29th to the 31st of October at the Enid Gospel Tabernacle. About 150 ministers and delegates from all over Oklahoma attended the gathering. Besides there were prominent visitors from several other states and a number of missionaries from foreign countries.

A number of excellent addresses were delivered Monday night and Tuesday by some of the visiting ministers including Pastor Chas. Sheall of Coffeyville, and Elder Gordon Miland and Sheall and Sheall of Coffeyville, and Elder Gordon Miland Sheal and Sheal Sheall and Sheal Sheall Sheal Shea lard, and some preliminary business attended to. Tuesday evening a young people's program was given. Clarence H. Gordon president of the Christ's Ambassadors of Oklahoma had charge of the service. The service was held in the Educational vice was held in the Educational Building on East Randolph. The musical part of the evening's program was under the direction of "Mother" Bamford who had trained the entire student body of Southwestern Bible School for this occasion. The student body sat on the platform in their uniforms and sang a number of choruses including some impressive missionary songs. This was followed by a message by M. J. McClellan on "What is Your Life?"

Wednesday morning, the new men's dormitory and dining hall was dedi-cated. Elder Fred Vogler, District Superintendent of the Kansas District Council, delivered the dedicatory address. This was followed by a statement of the financial condition of the

school by the president.

Elder James Hutsell then took charge of raising the money to complete the payment on the building and to clear the entire property of debt. An unusual scene followed. They started with hundred dollar pledges, then dropping to lower amounts. But every time they suggested a lower figure some one would say that he would give more than the amount asked for. For example, Bro. Hutsell tried several times to drop from twenty-five dollars to ten dollars but time and again, some one would stand up and say, "I'll give twenty-five up and say, "I'll give twenty-five dollars", until there were over one hundred twenty-five dollar pledges

This was kept up until \$8225 was pledged, which was considerably beyond the amount asked for. Some who had previously taken little inter-est in the work were moved by the
