

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# An MBA At Your Own Pace

## A Fresh Look

As SAGU holds steady to our identity and mission, we also welcome innovation. We embrace opportunities for growth through strategic planning to meet the needs of our undergraduate and graduate students.

That is why we are redesigning our Master's in Business Administration degree.

Beginning January of 2020, our MBA degree program will offer more personalization, course flexibility and the option to complete your degree at an accelerated rate.

**Students will have the opportunity to complete their MBA degree in 12, 18 or 24 months and will have six opportunities to start each year.**

"Offering students the ability to complete the program in a way that fits into their already busy lives is one of the many advantages of our updated MBA," says Dr. Shelly Zaldivar, Business Department Chair.

The new course structure will be **7 weeks**, with A & B sessions each semester and two 6-week compressed sessions during the summer.

Students CAN enroll and start in EITHER the A or B session.

Enrolling in two courses in each A & B session simultaneously allows for the **12-month degree completion** time.

With this update, students will not have to split their attention between several subjects at the same time. With only one or two subjects, the program will offer complete concentration on one course with a relatively manageable course load.

Dean of Distance Education and Extension Sites, Joseph Hartman, says, "I am looking forward to an MBA program which allows students to focus intensely on one course at a time while completing the same number of credit hours as they would in a semester.

## Elective Flexibility

Our elective courses provide an avenue to obtain a skill set specific to a student's career and leadership interests to complement our already strong core set of courses.

This update enables our graduate students to select graduate level electives that align with their career goals and interests. "Students can select courses such as Operations Management or Organizational Strategy," said Dr. Zaldivar. "Additionally, we will occasionally offer Special Topics courses."

## Looking Forward

Hartman shared that even bigger plans are on the horizon with plans to update several other undergraduate degree programs next year.

"Being in such a dynamic industry, these updates place our institution in a favorable position for the future while providing more options for our students."

## SAGU AIC President Receives Distinguished Administrator Award

Assemblies of God Alliance for Higher Education recognized longtime educator David J. Moore on Aug. 2 with the 2019 Distinguished Administrator Award.

Moore returned as president of the Phoenix-based American Indian College (AIC), now SAGU AIC, in 2013. He held the same post from 1987 to 1994, during which time the school became the only regionally accredited Christian college serving primarily Native Americans.

SAGU President Kermit Bridges, who nominated Moore for the honor, noted that 80 percent of the Native American AG pastors in Arizona and New Mexico are AIC graduates.

“David has spent a lifetime serving the Kingdom and the Fellowship, the lion’s share in service to higher education,” says President Bridges.

In 2016, AIC partnered with SAGU, which allowed AIC students to study additional subjects online. Since then, accreditation standards have been restored and finances have improved. Since Moore’s return, enrollment has increased by 32 percent and the number of students living on campus has risen by 198 percent.

“Influence, not authority, is what drives effectiveness,” Moore says. “If you don’t keep learning and growing, you soon become irrelevant.” ■

## Social Work Receives Accreditation Candidacy

Our Social Work Bachelor's Degree program has achieved Candidacy for Accreditation by the Council on Social Work Education's Commission on Accreditation.

Dr. Sandra Harp, Social Work Instructor and Program Coordinator, says, "Students graduating from a CSWE (Council on Social Work Education) accredited program have the ability to be in Advanced Placement at graduate schools with an accredited MSW (Master's of Social Work) program."

This benefit also allows undergraduate students to complete their master's degree in half the time due to many of the required courses for a master's level degree having been already completed at the undergraduate level. "Half the time, half the cost!" exclaimed Dr. Harp. ■

## Micah Rice Announced as Candidate for Texas Teacher of the Year

This past August, alumnus Micah Rice was announced as Region 10 Secondary Teacher of the year. Region 10 spans ten North Texas counties, serves over 130 school districts, and encompasses 56,000 teachers.

As the recipient of this award, he is now one of twenty teachers in the running for Texas Teacher of the Year.

“At my campus and district alone, I am surrounded by so many who deserve recognition for their efforts, so to be acknowledged there, and to move on and be recognized as the Region 10 Secondary Teacher of the Year, there truly are no words,” he said.

Although Micah was stunned by the announcement, his colleagues and administration were not so surprised.

According to a press release from Terrell Independent School District, Michael French, Superintendent of Terrell ISD, said, “I have been doing this a long time, and Micah Rice

is the best I have ever seen. When you love kids and have his work ethic and passion, great things happen for students.” Micah’s favorite component of teaching has always been establishing relationships with his students.

“Each day I get to encounter and engage students who will one day be our future politicians, preachers, teachers, attorneys, mechanics, doctors, and so forth. What an honor it is to get to play a small part in helping them find their way.”

It was during Micah’s time at SAGU that he realized teaching was about more than test scores, but rather a mission field on which he could help change the lives of his students.

“It was always about having a heart for people. That’s probably the greatest thing about SAGU to me,” he said. “It’s the same reason I teach. It’s about having a heart.”

Ultimately, it is Micah’s heart that has led him to his recent candidacy for Secondary Teacher of the Year. ■



## Coach Hank Moore Receives Coach of Character Award

The annual NAIA Coach of Character accolade is awarded to a head coach of an NAIA institution who has been outstanding in demonstrating and embracing the five core values of the NAIA Champions of Character initiative, using methods of teaching character through sport and in community leadership through volunteering or service.

After years of continued demonstrations of sportsmanship and integrity on the court, Hank Moore, Head Volleyball Coach, received the NAIA’s annual Coach of Character honor.
