


A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT:

As president of Southwestern Assemblies of God University (SAGU), Kermit S. Bridges is the longest serving president in the institution's 96-year history. With over two decades of leadership experience, Bridges is also the longest current tenured leader among AG institutions of higher education in the United States.

Since his appointment in 2000, Bridges has guided SAGU with unwavering commitment and passion.

Nestled on a sprawling 70-acre campus just south of Dallas-Fort Worth, SAGU is a testament to Bridges' vision and perseverance. Over the years, the campus has witnessed remarkable growth, with over half of the buildings constructed under Bridges' watchful eye. These state-of-the-art facilities are complemented by beautifully refurbished older structures, including the administration building, which is proudly listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Additionally, Niche, a leading college-ranking company, recognizes SAGU's commitment to the safety and well-being of its students. In fact, SAGU has been designated as the 14th safest campus in America, providing a secure and nurturing environment for students to learn, grow, and excel.

Last year, the University received the highest possible review from the regional accrediting agency Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. The SACSCOC reaffirmed SAGU's decennial accreditation - with

no recommendations, which is a significant accomplishment in the academic world.

SAGU's academic excellence is grounded in the unshakable foundation of Biblical principles. The University's commitment to faith-based education sets it apart from other higher ed institutions. Students must take 18 hours of Bible and theology instruction regardless of major. The modern chapel in the Sheaffer Center seats 1,800, where students gather three mornings a week. Plus, there are weekly devotionals at all six dorms. Faith is an integral part of campus life.

For Bridges, his deep roots in the Assemblies of God faith have played a pivotal role in shaping his

When SAGU faced financial challenges, Bridges' mother, Joyce, rallied church prayer groups to intercede on behalf of the University. In response, Bridges spearheaded a capital campaign in the 1990s that allowed SAGU to overcome its financial hurdles and flourish.

These dedicated educators possess academic expertise, are personally filled with the Spirit, and are actively involved in AG churches. Their unwavering support for the fellowship's positions on key issues, as outlined in the position papers, ensures that SAGU remains grounded in its Biblical and denominational roots.





THREADS OF OHY THROUGHOUT THE GENERATIONS



Worship has been a unifying thread throughout the history of SAGU. From the first days on campus to now, worshiping together has always marked meaningful moments of Holy Spirit encounters and growth for the individual and collective body. which now is specialized in worship leadership, media and sound, and creative art direction. Just under 50 students are currently enrolled in worship-related degrees.

The Joneses have assembled five worship teams for chapel services. "Our passion is to help students fall in love with Jesus," says Nathan. "We want to equip a new generation of worship leaders who aren't just great musicians."

gatherings known as The Well."It's a space where people come together and pursue God," Meredith says. Sometimes students sit in silence for long periods in an attempt to hear from God, or they might speak into the lives of others at the event. Healings and freedom from addictions have been hallmarks of the gatherings.

The Joneses are uniquely qualified to lead SAGU's worship arts program, which has earned a reputation for producing Spirit-led worship leaders. Worship team students have opportunities for practical hands-on ministry at district councils, youth retreats, church conferences, and national events. Teams travel to camps in locales such as Croatia, South Africa, and Mexico during the summer.

Meanwhile, SAGU remains committed to teaching future ministers and missionaries. District scholarships are available to church ministry majors to receive at least half off of tuition. The number of Bible and church ministry majors has remained at 45% for the past 30 years. SAGU has been a leading institution in producing AG-credentialed ministers appointed world missionaries throughout that span.

"We are intentional about going after God in worship, welcoming the operation of spiritual gifts, and prioritizing altar ministry in response to the preaching of the Word," says SAGU President, Kermit Bridges. Bridges says thrice-weekly chapel services and weekly dormitory devotions play a central role in cultivating a spiritual atmosphere on campus. Full-time residential hall directors in the five-campus dormitories are referred to as dorm pastors, given their role as spiritual leaders. Bridges also notes that classes begin with purposeful prayer for the nations.

Regardless of what discipline they are studying, all SAGU students must take six three-hour Bible/practical theology courses. "An underlying core value is that every believer is a minister," says Bridges. Along with that, every student is expected to be a worshiper. Chapels are held on campus Wednesday (missions), Thursday (student-led), and Friday (president-led) mornings. Tuesday night devotionals are conducted in dorms by three dozen resident assistants who guide students in learning from specific Bible verses.

Worship certainly is a thread woven throughout the lives of the generations of families that have attended SAGU. This spirit of worship and communion lies at the heart of SAGU - an unyielding commitment to love God, serve others, pursue truth, and ultimately uphold the kind of learning that leads to transformed lives.

Thompson's success in the classroom has been remarkable; she received Elementary Teacher of the Year honors for her campus in 2012 and Elementary Teacher of the Year for her entire district in 2016.
